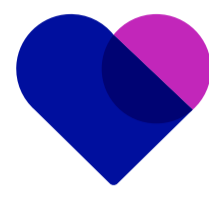
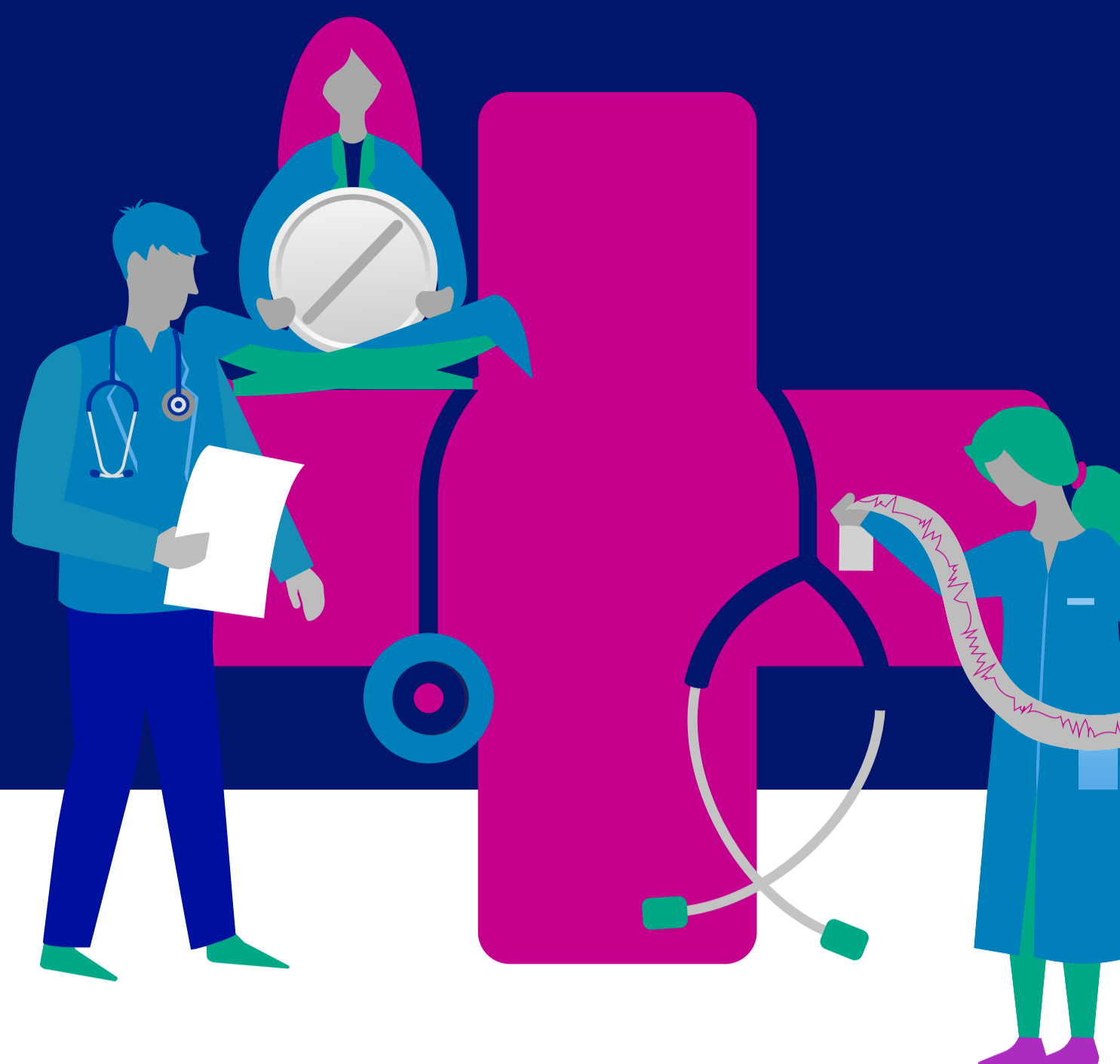


Best Ways to Recognize Nurses

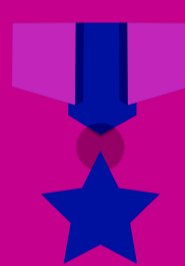
Above & Beyond
